ATTENTION!

OUR SPACE IS VERY LIMITED, THEREFORE, ONLY ENTRIES FROM THE FIVE COUNTIES OF ANTRIM, BENZIE, GRAND TRAVERSE, KALKASKA, AND LEELANAU WILL BE ACCEPTED. ALL 4-H MARKET ANIMALS TO BE SOLD IN THE AUCTION MUST BE WEIGHED ON ASSIGNED SCALES ONLY. WEIGH-IN TIME WILL BE BETWEEN 1:00PM AND 4:00PM ON SUNDAY, AUGUST 9TH. ALL EXHIBITS WILL BE RECEIVED SUNDAY, AUGUST 9, 2009, 10:00AM TO 6:00PM FOR GENERAL EXHIBITS, LIVESTOCK 8:00AM TO 6:00PM. ALL LIVESTOCK ARE TO REMAIN ON THE GROUNDS UNTIL SUNDAY, AUGUST 16, 2009, AT 7AM. DON'T EVEN THINK OF ASKING TO LEAVE EARLY!

ENTERING AN EXHIBIT!!!

1. All livestock exhibitors must read the State Requirements and National Code of Show Ring Ethics.
2. Market livestock exhibitors are prohibited from entering Northwestern Michigan Fair if the exhibitor has entered any market animal at any other fair in this calendar year.
3. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST PRE-REGISTER BY JULY 13, 2009. All animal fees and/or entry fees must accompany all pre-registration forms. All exhibitors must complete entry forms completely, including providing his/her Social Security Number. Entries failing to contain exhibitor's Social Security Number will not be accepted. Checks must be made payable to the NORTHWESTERN MICHIGAN FAIR ASSOCIATION. A service charge of \$20.00 will be charged for all returned/insufficient fund checks.
4. All exhibitors will be charged an entry fee of \$5.00 for every 10 items entered. Exhibit tickets will be issued upon arrival. Special rules are given in each division. Make certain that you check each department, division, and/or section rule for entry times and guidelines and comply with the rules.
5. The fairgrounds will be open for reception of livestock from 8:00AM to 6:00PM on Saturday, August 8, 2009. (Poultry Division please check division rules.)

6. All general exhibits will be received Sunday, August 9, from 10:00AM to 6:00PM. Please check division rules for exceptions.

7. All exhibits shall be shipped by the exhibitor or his agent, in no case shall any article be brought upon the grounds and placed upon exhibition except by and at the expense of the exhibitor or his authorized agent.

8. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium. Where there is but one exhibitor in a class, the animal or article may be awarded any award the judge deems appropriate.

9. Exhibitors having questions regarding placing should check with the Division Superintendent as soon as the judging is completed.

10. No exhibitor, unless in the presence of the respective Superintendent, will discuss any placing with the respective judge.

11. Every article or animal upon the Fairgrounds will be under the control of the Executive Committee, and every precautions will be taken for their safekeeping but, the Association will not be responsible for any damaged or loss that may occur, and upon this condition entries are received. No unregistered household pets will be allowed to be marketed on the fairgrounds.

12. THERE SHALL BE NO ENTRY FEES REFUNDED UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES.

13. APPEALS AND COMPLAINTS: An exhibitor compelled to bring a complaint regarding conflict of interest of the judge, disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor; Exhibitor, group leader, or superintendent's behavior, or eligibility of an exhibit shall make formal protest in writing to a Fair Board Executive Committee no later than ten days following the end of fair. All protests shall be referred to a special committee which shall review the protest with interested parties and give parties an opportunity to submit evidence. Report of findings shall be made to the Fair Board for final decision on the protest 14 days following date protest issuance. The party against whom the protest was filed shall have the right to read the statement of protest. Exhibitor may file appeal to the Department of Agriculture within 45 days of filing the initial complaint if the exhibitor is not satisfied with the association's action. The Department of Agriculture shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint, and shall issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and any recommended actions for the association.

14. Any animal suspected of being on tranquilizers or other drugs may be subject to test at the direction of three or more members of the Northwestern Michigan Livestock Council and Northwestern Michigan Fair Board.

a. The Northwestern Michigan Fair will perform livestock testing by an "at random" or "for cause" selection process by following these steps:

i. The initial complaints in writing must be received by the fair board detailing complainant's reason for requesting testing.

ii. A written reply from the exhibit owner regarding their response to the complaint must also be received by the fair board.

iii. The fair board will review the case and may, at their discretion, request a licensed veterinarian to collect a sample of urine, blood, tissue or other specimen for testing. If fair board requests a sample be collected, it will be done within 12 hours of the complaint being received by the fair board.

b. The Northwestern Michigan Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animals, either alive or slaughtered, wherein the exhibitor/owner of the animal entered into competition refuses to

allow the animal to be tested, or the drug test is positive for substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration, the United States Department of Agriculture or the Michigan Department of Agriculture. This includes, but is not limited to diuretics, steroids, repartitioning agents, tranquilizers, and analgesics. Exhibitors will notify the fair veterinarian before administering any medications to any animal brought in for competition. The exhibitor will forfeit auction privileges, premiums and awards. Other animals will not be moved up in placing.

5. Ribbons and rosettes will be awarded for all places as listed for each class, unless otherwise specified.

16. All dogs on the Fairgrounds must be kept on a leash no greater than 6 feet in length, under the immediate control of a responsible person and shall not be allowed to disturb or annoy Fairground visitors or animals. Leader dogs for the blind are permitted. The person that owns or is in immediate charge of any dog shall immediately remove all droppings and deposit in trash receptacle on Fairgrounds. No dogs or other animals are allowed in the Food Court area.

17. All trailers, tents, mobile homes must secure their parking spot from the Campground Superintendent before parking and will be charged an electrical hookup charge and/or a camping fee.

18. Vehicle parking in designated areas only! Parking in Fire Lane is not allowed. Vehicles will be towed at owner

**MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
ANIMAL INDUSTRY DIVISION:
2009 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN MICHIGAN
REVISED January 2009**

*Livestock means those species of animals used for human food and fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. Livestock includes but is not limited to cattle, sheep, new world camelids (llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos), goats, bison, captive cervidae, ratites (cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus), swine, equine, poultry, aquaculture, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs and cats.

GENERAL

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, and shows are required to comply with all of the statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Michigan relating to animal health outlined in Act No. 466 of the Publics Acts of 1988, as amended, and rules promulgated for the implementation and enforcement of the act.

1. A fair shall have an accredited veterinarian on call whenever there are animals on the premises during the fair. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall do all of the following as described herein:

a. Notify exhibitors of health tests and certificates for importation and exhibition in this state.

b. Examine and approve required health certificates, reports, test charts, certificates, or other required documentation before displaying, exhibiting, or stabling the animals in the exhibition area or before commingling with other animals.

c. Notify exhibitors whether or not poultry vaccinated against Infectious Laryngotracheitis (ILT) are allowed in the fair, exhibition , exposition, or show.

d. Assure that all participating equine test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA).

2. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, or exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

Livestock that have known exposure to, or that show clinical signs of, infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease as determined by a veterinarian shall not be displayed or housed at a fair, exhibition, exposition, or show unless permission to do so is granted by the director. The fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority is responsible for ensuring that the livestock are removed from the premises.

3. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show.

4. A bird shall not be handled except by the exhibitor, attendant, fair veterinarian, director, or judge after the bird is placed in an exhibition coop.

5a. **Starting March 1, 2007, all cattle moving to a show, sale, or exhibition are required to have an official Radio Frequency Devise (FRID) ear tag.** Exhibitors may call the National Holstein Association at 1-800-952-5200 to order RFID tags at cost of \$2.00 per tag.

5b. **All out-of-state cattle exhibited in Michigan shall be tagged with an official Radio Frequency Identification Devise (RFID) ear tag.** Tags can be ordered by calling the RJ Matthews Co. at (330)-834-3000, ext 2013 or by calling Indiana Animal Health, Inc. at (219)-279-2378.

6. All goats, sheep, and privately-owned cervids shall bear official identification before they leave their home premises.

7. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that all requirements for testing, identification, and official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection are fulfilled prior to the importation and that proof of fulfilling these requirements is provided to the director, fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority upon request.

8. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock.

9. Out-of-state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and shall be accompanied by a copy of an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin. Livestock shall not be diverted to premises other than the destination site named on the official interstate health certificate.

10. Whenever an official test is conducted or an official vaccination is administered,

livestock shall, unless exempted by the director, be permanently identified in a manner approved by the director.

11. Unless otherwise approved by the director, a facility for exhibition of livestock shall be constructed to allow sufficient separation of each exhibitor's livestock. The facility shall be constructed of a material that can be adequately cleaned and disinfected.

12. An exhibition building or yarding facility shall be cleaned and disinfected with an United States Department of Agriculture approved disinfectant used in accordance with label instructions before livestock are admitted by removing from the premises all manure, litter, hay, straw, and forage from pens, runways and show rings, and thoroughly disinfecting walls, partitions, floors, mangers, awarding facilities, and runways in a manner approved by the director. MDA is currently using Virkon S for field activities. For a complete list of disinfectants, please refer to www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo.

13. Feed and water containers provided for exhibition coops shall be new or properly cleaned.

14. A feed or water container from which a bird has eaten or drunk shall be refilled in such a manner as to prevent contamination of the common supply of feed and water. A feed or water container may not be removed from an exhibition coop except for purpose of cleaning.

15. An exhibition coop shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before and after each exhibition.

16. Primary enclosures and stall areas shall be constructed and placed to provide adequate light for proper inspection for evidence of transmissible diseases.

17. Cage litter and bedding shall be clean and shall be replaced daily, or as often as needed.

18. A shipping crate used in shipment of birds of common carrier may not be used as an exhibition coop. Shipping crates shall be cleaned and disinfected on the day of arrival after the birds have been removed for exhibition and before being used again. Unless otherwise necessary shipping crates shall not be stored in the exhibition area.

19. Out-of-state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and **shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection** issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

2009 NATIVE MICHIGAN HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN MICHIGAN

CATTLE AND BISON

1. Cattle with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

2. **Starting March 1, 2007, all cattle moving to a show, sale, or exhibition are required to have an official radiofrequency identification devise (RFID) ear tag.** Exhibitors may call Northstar Cooperative at 1-800-631-3510, extension 668, or National Holstein Association at 1-800-952-5200 to order RFID tags at a cost of \$2.00 per tag.

3. The following are Michigan's bovine tuberculosis testing, identification, and movement requirements:

All Zones within Michigan

Animal Identification

Effective August 15, 2007, all cattle must be identified with RFID Electronic identification ear tags prior to movement from a premises within Michigan, unless exempted by the director. Initial identification of cattle must utilize an RFID Electronic identification ear tag issued by the Michigan Department of Agriculture to the premises at which the identification occurs. Official identification tags may not be transferred between premises or used on animals not included in the herd on the premises to which the tags are issued.

Livestock Inspection Check-Points

All livestock transportation equipment (vehicles) and anyone transporting livestock must stop at any posted Livestock and Plant Inspection Point. Upon stopping of the vehicle, a person transporting the livestock shall produce documentation and information demonstrating compliance with livestock movement requirements, and the direct shipping destination of the livestock.

Modified Accredited Zone - includes the entirety of Alcona, Alpena, Antrim, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Crawford, Emmet, Montmorency, Oscoda, Otsego, and Presque Isle counties, and those portions of Iosco and Ogemaw counties that are north of the southernmost boundaries of the Huron National Forest and the AuSable State Forest.

Surveillance Testing Requirements

All cattle herds must complete an annual whole herd bovine tuberculosis test of all cattle twelve (12) months of age and older, and all goats, bison, or privately owned cervids six (6) months of age or older in contact with the herd, unless specifically exempted by the director. Retesting of herds must be done within 9-15 months of the anniversary date of the initial whole herd test.

Movement Testing Requirements

Movement within the Modified Accredited Zone

- Cattle must comply with one of the following prior to movement:
 - a. Originate directly from a bovine tuberculosis accredited free herd, OR
 - b. Originate from a herd which has received a whole herd test within sixty (60) days prior to movement, OR
 - c. Receive a negative bovine tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days prior to movement.
 - Calves less than two(2) months of age may be moved if they originate from a herd that has completed a whole herd test within twelve (12) months prior to movement.
 - Steers or spayed heifers may be moved to a registered terminal operation, or between terminal operations without meeting tuberculosis testing requirements.

- Cattle may be moved to an FSIS approved slaughter plant, or through one concentration point to an FSIS approved slaughter plant, without meeting tuberculosis testing requirements.

Movement into another Zone within Michigan

- Cattle two (2) months of age and older must comply with one of the following prior to movement:
 - a. Originate directly from a bovine tuberculosis accredited free herd, OR
 - b. Originate from a herd that has received a whole herd bovine tuberculosis test within twelve (12) months prior to movement, and receive a negative bovine tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days prior to movement (steers and spayed heifers do not need to meet the whole herd testing requirement).
 - Cattle less than two (2) months of age may be moved if they originate from a herd that has completed a whole herd test within twelve (12) months prior to movement.
 - Cattle may be moved to an FSIS approved slaughter plant, or through one concentration point to an FSIS approved slaughter plant, without meeting tuberculosis testing requirements.

Movement Certificate Requirements

Movement within the Modified Accredited Zone

- A movement certificate is required to be obtained prior to movement of any cattle from a premises within the modified accredited zone, unless specifically exempted by the Director. Cattle moved to an approved licensed livestock sale yard located in the modified accredited zone may receive a movement certificate upon arrival.

Movement into another Zone in Michigan

- All cattle with a destination of a concentration point must receive a new certificate that identifies the final destination of movement.
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Modified Accredited Advanced Zone - includes the remainder of the Lower Peninsula of Michigan.

Surveillance Resting Requirements

All herds must obtain a premises identification number, and be placed into a database from which herds will be randomly selected for whole herd testing. Proportional samples of beef and dairy farms will be selected from each Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service (MASS) agriculture district based upon the total number of farms in that district. Selection will occur on a two-year cycle.

Selected herds, or herds selected as a replacement for herds determined ineligible for testing, shall be subject to whole herd testing of all cattle in the herd eighteen (18) months of age or older, and all bison, goats, and privately owned cervids six (6) months of age or older in contact with the herd. This testing must occur within ninety (90) days after the person responsible for herd management receives notification that a whole herd test under this surveillance program is due and necessary.

Movement Testing Requirements

Movement into another Zone within Michigan

- Sexually intact cattle six (6) months of age or older must meet one of the following prior to movement:
 - a. Originate directly from a bovine tuberculosis accredited free herd, OR
 - b. Receive a negative bovine tuberculosis test within six (60) days prior to movement.
 - Cattle less than six (6) months of age, steers and spayed heifers of any age, or cattle moving to an FSIS approved slaughter plant, do not need to meet tuberculosis testing requirements prior to movement.
 - Sexually intact heifers that are moving to a registered terminal operation or a USDA approved feedlot do not need to meet tuberculosis testing requirement prior to movement.

Movement within the Modified Accredited Advanced Zone

- No tuberculosis testing is required for movement of cattle within the zone, or through a livestock concentration point to a final destination within the zone.

Movement Certification Requirements

Movement within the Modified Accredited Advanced Zone

- No movement certificate is required for movement within the modified accredited advanced zone.

Movement into another zone within Michigan

- All cattle must receive an official movement certificate prior to movement to any other zone within Michigan, unless specifically exempted by the director.

Bovine Tuberculosis Free Zone - includes the entirety of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

Surveillance Testing Requirements

All herds must obtain a premises identification number, and be placed into a database from which herds will be randomly selected for whole herd testing. Proportional samples of beef and dairy farms will be selected from each Michigan Agriculture Statistics Service (MASS) agriculture district based upon the total number of farms in that district. Selection will occur on a two-year cycle.

Selected herds, or herds selected as a replacement of herds determined ineligible for testing, shall be subject to whole herd testing of all cattle in the herd eighteen (18) months of age or older, and all bison, goats, and privately owned cervids six (6) months of age or older in contact with the herd. This testing must occur within ninety (90) days after the person responsible for herd management receive notification that a whole herd test under this surveillance program is due and necessary.

Movement Testing and Certification Requirements

No tuberculosis testing or movement certificate is required to move within the bovine tuberculosis free zone, or to other zones in Michigan.

HORSES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

1. Equidae with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be

removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

2. All equidae, except foals under six (6) months or nursing their dam, entered in a fair, exhibition, exposition, or show must test negative to an official Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test within the current calendar year. Exhibitors must be able to present proof in the form of an official EIA laboratory report. NOTE: Calendar year is defined at December 1st through the 31st of the following December 13 months).

3. A fair, exhibition, exposition or show authority is responsible for assuring that all participating equidae are test-negative for EIA.

GOATS

1. Goats with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

2. All goats moved within Michigan shall be identified with official USDA scrapie program identification prior to movement off the farm. Contact the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) at 866-USDA-TAG (866-873-2824) for ear tags.

3. Do not remove tags prior to weigh-in or showing. It is illegal to remove official USDA individual animal identification.

SHEEP

1. Sheep with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

2. All sheep moved within Michigan shall be identified with official USDA scrapie program identification tags prior to movement off the farm. Contact the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) at 866-USDA-TAG (866-873-2824) for ear tags.

3. Do not remove tags prior to weigh-in or showing. It is illegal to remove official USDA individual animal identification.

SWINE

1. Swine with clinical signs of infections, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, or exposition or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

2. For the 2009 fair season, all swine shall be uniquely identified with individual **ear tag** identification or other identification approved by MDA. Registered swine accompanied by registration papers may be identified by ear notches.

3. Swine shall not enter any fair, exhibition, exposition, or show facility unless it can be

demonstrated that the swine presented for exhibition or exposition meet at least **one of the following conditions:**

- a. Originate as a direct movement from a swine premises located in a pseudorabies Stage IV or higher area or region or other equivalent low prevalence area as recognized by the director, OR
- b. Originate directly from a pseudorabies qualified-negative herd as defined in *Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations*, which proof may consist of a copy of a valid certificate issued by the department stating that the herd meets the requirements for a pseudorabies qualified-negative herd, OR
- c. Unless the swine are piglets nursing a pseudorabies negative sow, present an official swine test report that indicates the swine have been tested for pseudorabies within 45 days before exhibition and have tested negative.

NOTE; Michigan has been pseudorabies free (Stage V) since 2000.

4. All swine removed from any exhibition facility shall be moved directly to a livestock auction market or slaughter facility premises for disposition in accordance with applicable laws concerning movement of swine to slaughter, unless all swine present at the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show facility at any time for any reason meet **one of the following requirements:**

- a. Originate as a direct movement from a swine premises located in a pseudorabies Stage IV or higher area or region or other equivalent low prevalence area as recognized by the director, OR
- b. Originate directly from a pseudorabies qualified-negative herd as defined in *Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations*, which proof may consist of a copy of a valid certificate issued by the department stating that the herd meets the requirements of a pseudorabies qualified-negative herd, OR
- c. Unless the swine are piglets nursing a pseudorabies negative sow, present an official swine test report that indicates the swine have been tested for pseudorabies with in 45 days before exhibition and have tested negative.

Note; Michigan has been pseudorabies free (Stage V) since 2000.

POULTRY

(Chickens, guinea fowl, turkeys, waterfowl, pigeons, doves, peafowl, and game birds)

1. All poultry except waterfowl, pigeons, and doves shown at public exhibition in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - a. Originate directly from a U.S. pullorum-typhoid clean flock as defined in *Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations*, and all amendments to that publication thereafter adopted pursuant to rules that the director may promulgate, OR
 - b. Have a negative official test for salmonella pullorum-typhoid within 90 days before the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show facility and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive salmonella pullorum-typhoid test status.
2. Individual birds originating from non-National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) qualified flocks may be tested at the show or exhibition prior to being caged and housed with other poultry and if negative, be allowed to participate in the show or exhibition.
3. Documentation of birds originating from a certified NPIP flock must be presented at the

show or exhibition (parent flock NPIP certification number, VS9-2, VS9-3, or Michigan Department of Agriculture state pullorum test certificate).

RABBITS

Rabbits with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

1

LLAMAS, ALPACAS, VICUNAS, AND GUANACOS

Llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, be isolated on the premises.

CASSOWARIES, KIWIS, OSTRICHES, AND EMUS

Cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, or exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

CERVIDAE

1. Cervidae with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises and must meet current requirements contained within Act No. 466 of the Public Acts of 1988, as amended, the Animal Industry Act, for movement of privately-owned cervidae in Michigan.

2. All live privately-owned cervids moving from one premises to another premises within this state shall be officially identified with an identification approved by the director.

3. All live privately-owned cervids six (6) months of age or older moving from one premises to another premises within this state, except those consigned directly to a state or federally inspected slaughter facility premises, shall comply with one of the following:

a. Originate directly from an official tuberculosis accredited, qualified or monitored herd as outlined in *Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication: Uniform Methods and Rules, effective January 22, 1999*, approved by Veterinary Services of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and all amendments to those publications thereafter adopted pursuant to the rules that the director may promulgate, and be accompanied by a copy of the current official letter from the United States Department of Agriculture verifying herd status, OR

b. Originate directly from a herd that has received an official negative tuberculosis test of all privately-owned cervids twelve (12) months of age or older and all cattle and goats six (6) months of age and older in contact with the herd within 24 months before movement, OR

c. Originate directly from a herd that has received an official negative tuberculosis test of all privately-owned cervids twelve (12) months of age or older and all cattle and goats six (6) months of age or older in contact with the herd more than 24 months before movement, AND receive an individual negative official test for tuberculosis within 90 days before movement, AND be accompanied by a copy of the official tests for tuberculosis verifying that testing, OR

d. Be isolated from all other members of the herd and receive two official negative tests for tuberculosis at 90- and 120-day intervals before movement and be accompanied by copies of the official tests for tuberculosis verifying that testing. The second negative test shall be within ninety (90) days before movement.

4. All live privately-owned cervids less than six (6) months of age moving from one premises to another premises within this state, except those consigned directly to a state or federally inspected slaughter facility premises, must comply with one of the following:

a. Originate directly from an official tuberculosis accredited, qualified or monitored herd as outlined in *Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication: Uniform Methods and Rules effective January 22, 1999*, approved by Veterinary Services of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the United States Department of Agriculture and all amendments to those publications thereafter adopted pursuant to rules that the director may promulgate, AND be identified by an official identification, AND be accompanied by a copy of the current official letter from the Michigan Department of Agriculture verifying the herd status, OR

b. Originate directly from a herd that has received an official negative tuberculosis test of all privately-owned cervids twelve (12) months of age or older and all cattle and goats six (6) months of age and older in contact with the herd within 24 months before movement, OR

c. Originate directly from a herd that has received a negative tuberculosis test of all privately-owned cervids twelve (12) months of age or older and all cattle and goats six (6) months of age or older in contact with the herd more than 24 months before movement and be accompanied by an official permit for movement of privately-owned cervids less than six (6) months of age within Michigan, or an official interstate health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian, and remain at the destination stated on the permit or official interstate health certificate until it receives an official negative tuberculosis test when it reaches six (6) months of age, but not more than eight (8) months of age.

5. For purposes of this section, the age of the privately-owned cervids shall be determined by the age placed on the official permit for movement of privately-owned cervids less than six (6) months of age in Michigan, or the official interstate health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian. A copy of the official test for tuberculosis and a copy of the official permit for movement of privately-owned cervids less than six (6) months of age within Michigan or the official interstate health certificate shall be forwarded to the department within ten (10) days following completion of the testing.

2009 OUT-OF-STATE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN MICHIGAN

Out-of-state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and **shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection** issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin. Livestock shall not be diverted to a premises other than the destination site named on the official interstate health certificate.

If vesicular stomatitis outbreaks have occurred in the state of origin within the past thirty (30) days, the following statement must be included by the accredited veterinarian on any official

interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection for importation of equidae, cattle, sheep, goats, bison, New World camelids, swine, or privately owned cervidae into Michigan:

“I have examined the animals listed on this certificate and have found no clinical signs of vesicular stomatitis. To the best of my knowledge, these animals have not been exposed to vesicular stomatitis within the previous 30 days, nor have they been vaccinated with vesicular stomatitis vaccine.”

All cattle, goats, and bison of any age and reproductive capability, unless transported directly to a USDA inspected slaughter facility, must be identified with a USDA approved official identification ear tag, or official breed registration tattoo, prior to importation (see below for additional identification requirements for exhibited cattle). An official breed registration tattoo may only be used if the animal is accompanied by the official breed registration certificate during the movement. The official identification must be recorded on the required official interstate health certification or official certificate of veterinary inspection.

Dairy cattle, breeding cattle, feeder heifers, horses or other equidae, breeding swine, feeder swine, market hogs, llamas, alpacas, privately-owned cervids, aquaculture, and wild animals for exhibition originating outside the state of Michigan shall meet the following requirements:

DAIRY OR BREEDING CATTLE

1. **All out-of-state cattle exhibited in Michigan shall be tagged with an official radio frequency identification devise (RFID) ear tag.** Tags can be ordered by calling the RJ Matthews Co. at (330)-834-3000, ext 2013 or by calling Indiana Animal Health, Inc. at (219)-279-2378.
2. Female cattle over nineteen (19) months of age that are officially vaccinated against brucellosis and bulls and female cattle over six (6) months of age not officially vaccinated against brucellosis shall meet at least one of the following requirements:
 - a. Test negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty (30) days before importation, OR
 - b. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd, OR
 - c. Originate directly from a state which has maintained, for the previous six (6) consecutive years prior to importation, a certified brucellosis class free status as defined in *Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations* and the *Brucellosis Uniform Methods and Rules effective February 1, 1998*, approved by the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, and all amendments to those publications thereafter adopted pursuant to rules that the director may promulgate.
3. Cattle entering the state shall meet at least one of the following tuberculosis requirements and shall be recorded on the official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection by the accredited veterinarian preparing the certificate.
 - a. Originate directly from an accredited tuberculosis-free state, OR
 - b. Originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free zone, OR
 - c. Originate directly from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd, OR
 - d. Sexually intact cattle over six (6) months of age, goats, and bison from states or regions classified as bovine tuberculosis modified accredited advanced may be imported if they are

classified as negative to an official test for bovine tuberculosis within sixty (60) days prior to importation. Cattle less than eighteen (18) months of age, steers, and spayed heifers, or cattle moving directly to slaughter, from states or regions classified as bovine tuberculosis modified accredited advanced do not require tuberculosis testing prior to entry.

e. Originate from a herd that has had a negative whole herd test within the preceding twelve (12) months, AND have a negative tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days before importation.

FEEDER CATTLE

1. **All out-of-state cattle exhibited in Michigan shall be tagged with an official radio frequency identification device (RFID) ear tag.** Tags can be ordered by calling the RJ Matthews Co. at (330)-834-3000, ext 2013 or by calling Indiana Animal Health, Inc. at (219)-279-2378.

2. All feeder cattle imported into Michigan must be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection.

a. All feeder heifers under twenty (20) months of age must be individually identified by an official USDA ear tag*. Individual identification must be recorded on the interstate health certificate.

*Note. Feeder heifers may be identified by an USDA official back tag recorded on the health certificate. Within ten days of arrival, official USDA silver ear tags shall be placed in one ear. These silver tag numbers are to be recorded on the importing health certificate and a copy sent to the State Veterinarian's Office within ten days after importation of the cattle.

b. Feeder heifers over twenty (20) months of age must meet the requirements for dairy and/or breeding cattle.

3. Feeder cattle shall be kept segregated from native dairy or breeding cattle at the Michigan destination until slaughter.

HORSES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

1. All equidae require an official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection prepared by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

2. All equidae, except foals under six (6) months of age and nursing their dam, being moved into the state must test negative to an official Equine Infections Anemia (EIA) test within the current calendar year. NOTE: Calendar year is defined as December 1st through 31st of the following December (13 months). The date, laboratory, accession number, and the results of the latest EIA test must be documented on the health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection.

SWINE - GENERAL

1. Swine imported into this state shall be individually identified by an official ear tag or tattoo which includes the United State Department of Agriculture code from the state of origin or, only for registered swine accompanied by registration papers, by ear notches, or other identification approved by MDA.

2. The importation of swine vaccinated for pseudorabies is prohibited except upon a special permit issued by the director.

3. A person shall not bring swine into this state from auction sales of other collection facilities where slaughter swine are handled.

BREEDING SWINE

1. Breeding swine brought into this state, shall meet one of the following requirements:
 - a. Shall be accompanied by proof that the swine have tested negative to an official test for brucellosis in a 1:25 dilution, conducted in a state or federal laboratory within thirty (30) days before importation with the official results of the test recorded on the pre-approved official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection by the accredited veterinarian preparing the certificate, OR
 - b. Shall originate directly from a validated brucellosis free herd of swine, OR
 - c. Originate from a herd located in a brucellosis free state as determined by the director.

2. Breeding swine imported into this state, shall meet one of the following:
 - a. Test negative to an official pseudorabies test conducted within thirty (30) days before importation with the official results of the test recorded on the pre-approved official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection by the accredited veterinarian preparing the certificate, OR
 - b. Shall originate directly from a pseudorabies qualified negative herd as defined in *Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations*, OR
 - c. Originate from a pseudorabies free state or region as determined by the director.

3. The pseudorabies post-entry test requirements for breeding swine entering Michigan for exhibition and show are waived unless the swine are sold from a fair, exhibition, exposition, or show facility to a Michigan buyer.
 4. Breeding swine purchased by a Michigan buyer from a fair, exhibition, exposition, or show facility shall remain on the premises of the buyer until the buyer obtains an official test negative for pseudorabies conducted not less than thirty (30) or more than sixty (60) days following the date of importation.

Any person bringing breeding swine into Michigan onto a premises not quarantined for pseudorabies shall cause the breeding swine to be officially tested for pseudorabies not less than thirty (30) or more than sixty (60) days following the date of importation.

FEEDER SWINE

1. Feeder pigs imported into this state shall meet one of the following requirements:
 - a. Originate directly from a qualified negative pseudorabies free herd or directly from a feeder pig monitored herd, OR
 - b. Originate directly from a state which participates in a pseudorabies testing program that is approved by the director, OR
 - c. Originate directly from a pseudorabies free state or region as designated by the United States Department of Agriculture or as determined by the director, OR
 - d. Individually test negative for pseudorabies within thirty (30) days prior to importation.

SHEEP

1. Sheep for exhibition shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection.
2. Sheep shall originate from a flock free from clinical signs of foot rot.
3. Must follow interstate health requirements for sheep:
 - a. An official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all sheep except those consigned directly to a slaughter facility or to a livestock auction market for sale for slaughter. *Note: All sheep must be officially individually identified by ear tag, tattoo, or registration number. The individual identification must be recorded on the health certificate. (Call the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) at 866-873-2824 to verify most recent health requirements and for ear tags.)*
 - b. Documentation that the sheep originate from a flock free from clinical signs of foot rot must be on the health certificate.
4. Do not remove tags prior to weigh-in or showing. It is illegal to remove official USDA individual animal identification.

GOATS

1. Goats shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection.
2. Goats shall be officially individually identified.
3. Goats entering this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements regarding bovine tuberculosis:
 - a. Originate directly from an accredited bovine tuberculosis-free state or bovine tuberculosis-free zone as defined in *Title 9 in the Code of Federal Regulations* and the *Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication: Uniform Methods and Rules, effective January 22, 1999*, approved by Veterinary Services of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and all amendments to those publications thereafter adopted pursuant to the rules that the director may promulgate, OR
 - b. Originate directly from an accredited bovine tuberculosis-free herd as defined in *Title 9 in the Code of Federal Regulations* and the *Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication: Uniform Methods and Rules, effective January 11, 1999*, approved by Veterinary Services of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and all amendments to those publications thereafter adopted pursuant to the rules that the director may promulgate, OR
 - c. Regarding goats not meeting the requirements of a. or b., or both, originate directly from a state or a zone whose bovine tuberculosis status is less than accredited bovine tuberculosis-free as defined in *Title 9 in the Code of Federal Regulations* and the *Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication: Uniform Methods and Rules, effective January 22, 1999*, approved by the Veterinary Services of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and all amendments to those publications thereafter adopted pursuant to the rules that the director may promulgate, shall originate from a herd that has had a negative

official whole herd test as defined in Section 9 within the preceding twelve (12) months and the individual goats being imported shall have had a negative official test for bovine tuberculosis within sixty (60) days before entry.

4. Goats more than (6) six months old, except wethers, shall test negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days before importation, with the official results of the test recorded on the official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection by an accredited veterinarian preparing the certificate, or originate directly from a herd that is certified brucellosis-free.

POULTRY

(Chickens, guinea fowl, turkeys, waterfowl, pigeons, doves, peafowl, and game birds)

1. All poultry and other birds for exhibition imported into this state require an official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

2. Poultry vaccinated for Infectious Laryngotracheitis (ILT) shall not be imported into this state unless permission from the director is granted. All restrictions placed by the director on the import of the poultry shall be followed.

3. All poultry imported into this state for exhibition shall meet one or both of the following requirements:

a. Originate directly from a U.S. pollorum-typhoid clean flock as defined in *Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations*, and all amendments to that publication thereafter adopted pursuant to rules that the director may promulgate.

b. Have a negative official test for salmonella pollorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days before importation and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive salmonella pullorum-typhoid test state.

4. Documentation of birds originating from a certified NPIP flock must be presented at the show or exhibition (parent flock NPIP certification number, VS9-2, VS9-3, or Michigan Department of Agriculture state pullorum test certificate).

RABBITS

1. All rabbits imported into this state for exhibition require an official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

2. A person shall not import or release a live San Juan rabbit in this state.

LLAMAS, ALPACAS, VICUNAS, AND GUANACOS

1. Llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos imported into this state for exhibition require an official interstate health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

2. Llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos shall be individually identified by an official

identification. The identification shall be listed on the official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection.

CASSOWARIES, KIWIS, OSTRICHES, AND EMUS

All cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus imported into this state for exhibition shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

WILD ANIMALS OR EXOTIC ANIMALS

A wild animal means any non-domesticated animal or any cross of a non-domesticated animal. An exotic animal means those animals that are not domestic or any cross of those animals not domestic to North America.

1. Any species having the potential to spread serious diseases or parasites, to cause serious physical harm, or to otherwise endanger native wildlife, human life, livestock, domestic animals, or property, as determined by the director, shall not be imported into this state.
2. The director may require compliance with any or all of the following prior to the importation of a wild animal or an exotic animal species not regulated by the Fish and Wildlife Service of the United States Department of Interior or the Department of Natural Resources of this state:
 - a. Physical examination by an accredited veterinarian be conducted after importation to determine the health status, proper housing, husbandry, and confinement of any animal permitted to enter this state.
 - b. Negative test results to specific official tests required by the director within a time frame before importation into this state as determined by the director.
 - c. Identification prior to importation in a manner approved by the director.
3. An official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection signed by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin shall accompany all wild animals or exotic animal species imported into this state.
4. A wild animal or exotic animal species permitted to enter this state shall receive housing, feeding, restraining, and care that is approved by the director.
5. A person shall not import or release live feral swine or any crosses of feral swine in this state for any purpose without permission from the director.
6. Prairie dogs, African rope squirrels, African tree squirrels, African (Gambian) giant pouched rats, African brush tailed porcupines, African dormice, and African striped mice may not be imported.

CERVIDAE

1. Effective April 25, 2003, deer and elk are not permitted to enter Michigan due to the potential threat of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD).

AQUACULTURE

1. A person shall not import aquaculture into this state without one of the following issued

by an accredited veterinarian:

- a. Official interstate health certificate, OR
 - b. Official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection, OR
 - c. Fish disease inspection report.
2. A person shall not import aquaculture from a hatchery or other facility with a record of an emergency fish disease within the past two (2) years.
 3. A person shall not import aquaculture exhibiting clinical signs of disease.
 4. A person shall import aquaculture into this state in accordance with the Amended Federal Order for Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia (VHS), effective November 14, 2006.

INFORMATION FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

1. Check each division and/or section for any additional rules or guidelines.
2. Check the rules for exhibitors in the front of the premium book.
3. Sawdust will be furnished for bedding for all animals, with exception of fiber animals or waiver by veterinarian. Exhibitors will be required to furnish all feed and supplies.
4. No livestock shall be removed from the Fairgrounds before 7AM , Sunday. August 16, 2009. Exhibitors will forfeit the premium awarded on any animals removed before times slated. Don't even think of asking to leave early.
5. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease; or deemed unworthy for exhibition will be removed from the fair.
6. An accredited veterinarian shall be on-call during the fair. Any individual services provided by the veterinarian shall be the responsibility of the individual.
7. Livestock helper passes will be available to any bonafide exhibitor of livestock at a reduced rate. They are for immediate family members. Limit two per family.
8. Stalls and pens will be provided for livestock and assigned in the order of application. All beef and dairy animals, except goats, will be secured by a chain around the neck and secured by chain to a secured pipe. No loose animals will be allowed to remain on the grounds.
9. Animals occupying stalls and pens must be duly entered upon the entry books of the section and shown in competition.
10. Copies of pedigrees, statement as to breeder, feeding and management of stock will be required from all exhibitors if the Superintendent demands it.
11. Grooms and attendants must be neatly and cleanly dressed and must put the stalls, pens, and floors in a neat and tidy condition by 9:00AM. Tack will be kept out of walkways. Infractions of these rules or other barn rules directed by the Superintendent in charge may result in dismissal of the exhibitor and their animal from the fairgrounds with all premiums forfeited.
12. All animals entered for exhibition must be placed in the department prior to 6:00PM Sunday, and if not so placed, the owners will hereby forfeit all rights to exhibit or compete for premiums unless relieved from such results or forfeiture by order of the Superintendent of the department in which they are entered.

13. Exercise time for animals shall be before 10:00AM and between 4:00PM and 6:00PM. All barns will be closed at 10:00PM.
14. Animals are not to be tied to show rings.
15. Animals are to be exercised in livestock area ONLY.
16. All horses on the grounds must have a negative Coggins test within the calendar year.

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) NATIONAL CODE OF ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agriculture education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at the livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics" fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmation responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair or livestock show officials, proof of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fair or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with the applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prime facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to provide otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substances or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external application of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivances, or other similar practice are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute to

cooperate with another person or persons whether by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Exposition, including and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understand the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action that contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulation, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

3. All horses and ponies for exhibition must be free from infectious and contagious diseases. The Fair Association reserves the right to remove unfit animals from the grounds.

4. Horses and ponies must be sound to compete, except in the case of mares injured by accident (which does not impair them for usefulness). Blemishes not considered as unsoundness are left to the discretion of the judge.

5. All horses and ponies shall be in by 6:00PM Saturday, and will remain until 7AM the following Sunday. Don't even think of asking to leave early.

6. No horse or pony shall be entered in more than one halter class except Championship class.

7. Ages of animals will be computed from December 31 of the current year.

8. Exhibitors age will be computed from December 31 of the current year. Exhibitors must be 6 years of age or older, except leadline.

9. Each class entry shall be charged a \$4.00 entry fee except Championship classes.

10. Exhibitors of horses and ponies will be required to perform for exhibit under the direction of the judge (who has charge of the class in which the entries are made). Obedience to the direction of the judge will be required. The judge has pull power to rule out of competition all who do not comply with the requirements. The Superintendent may override the judge.

11. Horses and ponies may not be ridden or removed from stalls between 10:00AM to 4:00PM and after 6:00PM, unless otherwise informed by the Superintendent.
 12. A novice rider or showman is considered a first year showperson.
 13. All stalls are filled on a first come, first serve basis. This will be based on the pre-registration date received at the Fair Office.
 14. The right to split classes is based upon the discretion of the Superintendent and/or judge.
 15. Stalls may be painted white ONLY!
 16. When riding you must wear a shoe/boot with a stepped heel.
 17. Sidewalk and "on deck" rules will be enforced. No horses allowed on the sidewalks or standing on the ring side of the sidewalks.
 18. "Unsafe actions" determined by the Superintendent or infractions of these rules, involving an exhibitor is grounds for dismissal of the exhibitor and their animal from the Fairgrounds with all premiums being forfeited.
 19. There must be 3 entries to hold a class. If there are not enough entries, classes will be combined at Superintendent's discretion.
 20. Reference barn rules for additional items.

8. Infraction of the rules directed by the Superintendent in charge may result in dismissal of exhibitor and animal from the Fairgrounds with all premiums being forfeited.

DIVISION RULES:

1. READ ALL GENERAL RULES AND INFORMATION REGARDING LIVESTOCK in the front of premium book. These rules and information apply to 4-H animals.
2. The 4-H division is open to any boy or girl, currently active in 4-H in any of the following counties: Antrim, Benzie, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, & Leelanau.
3. For purposes of clarification, each market specie will be noted as TERMINAL or NON-TERMINAL. TERMINAL meaning those animals that must go to slaughter following the auction and NON-TERMINAL meaning those animals that may be taken home or slaughtered at buyer's choice following the auction. Each specie will be noted as TERMINAL or NON-TERMINAL. All auction buyers will sign a Buyers Agreement Waiver stipulating per Department of Agriculture. ALL TERMINAL animals must go to slaughter.
4. Members must be age 9 to participate in the market program, with the exception of a steer project, where the member must be age 12 or older. Members who are 5 to 8 years old should select animal types that they can safely handle. "4-H age" will be determined by a young person's age as of January 1st of the 4-H program year (which runs from September 1st to August 31st).
5. Members who are aged 5 to 8, 4-H Cloverbuds, must have direct one-on-one adult assistance while participating with their animal projects. In addition, all classes and shows for 5 to 8 year olds will be noncompetitive where each member receives recognition for participating. Cloverbuds may not participate in competitive classes, sales, treaties, and auctions at 4-H events.
6. Members entering market or breed classes must be rightful owner of animal and have been registered in their county MSU Extension office by the deadline specified by the 4-H Livestock Council. Reference the 4-H Livestock Guidebook for specific rules and details.
7. All livestock members must complete by the Fair entry deadline, Fair registration forms.
8. 4-H livestock projects may also be shown in open classes, except where specified.
9. Exhibitor may show one entry per class.
10. 4-H members need not show ownership of animals, but must be completely responsible for keeping records, raising, training, showing, selling and delivery of animal until time project is completed.
11. 4-H members shall be present to show their animal in Showmanship, Market, and Sale, except by permission of the 4-H Livestock Council Executive Board.
12. All livestock must remain on the fairgrounds until closing Sunday at 7AM.
13. Members should wear proper attire in the show ring. Clothing with club names or personal names cannot be worn in show ring. Ownership of project cannot be identified until all judging is complete.
14. Breed animals must be on fairgrounds before 4PM Saturday.
15. Market animals must be on fairgrounds before 1PM on Saturday. Weighing will take place between 1PM and 4PM, Saturday.

16. All poultry, except pigeons and doves, must have Pullorum Test Certificate. Pullorum testing is available on fairgrounds from 10AM to 4PM, Saturday.
17. 4-H horses must be on fairgrounds by 6PM Saturday and remain until 7AM the following Sunday. Don't even think of asking to leave early.
18. The Specie Chairperson will determine showmanship classes based on number of entries, age of 4-H member and experience with that specific specie.
19. All 4-H livestock showmanship classes will be placed A, B, C, except Cloverbud classes, which will receive participation ribbons only. (no premiums paid for 4-H Cloverbud or Dog classes).. SHOWMANSHIP PREMIUMS: A-\$2.00, B-\$1.50, C-\$1.00.
20. All breed classes will be placed A, B, C. Cloverbuds will receive participation ribbons only.
21. Grand and Reserve Championship classes will include 1st and 2nd place winners from all Showmanship classes competing for Rosette.
22. The judge's decision is final.
23. Market and Breed Books are required of 4-H members with market animal projects. Reference 4-H Animal Guidebook for specific rules.
24. 4-H Market Projects will be assessed a 3% of gross sale to cover costs of programs related to the project. Reference 4-H Livestock Guidebooks for specific rules.
25. Any situation regarding 4-H livestock classes not covered by the project rules listed in the 4-H Animal Guidebook, or these general livestock rules will be put before the 4-H Executive Board for their consideration and recommendation to the Fair Executive Board . Consultation will be made with appropriate 4-H staff person when necessary.
26. Decisions regarding the 4-H Market Livestock projects effecting the operation of the Northwestern Michigan Fair will be subject to approval by the Fair Board.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ANIMALS:

1. STEERS

- a. Must be of beef type.
- b. Stags will be disqualified.
- c. Horns not to exceed 3" (evidence of dehorning)
- d. No more than 18 months of age at Fair time, with exception of Scotch Highland that may not be more than 24 months.
- e. 2-stage/4-way vaccination containing IBR, BRSV, PB, and BVD type I & II are required.
- f. Use of false tail heads or adding hair or hemp is prohibited. Coloring agents, except powders, may only be used on the legs and tail switch. Use of powders are prohibited. No coloring agents may be used above the animal's flank. This includes colored show foams (black, red, etc.). No forced administration of fluids to create gut fill will be allowed. Violation will result in disqualification of the entry and exhibitor.

2. JUNIOR BEEF

- a. All animals must be beef type.
- b. All animals must be steers or heifer calves.
- c. All animals must be born after February 1st of current year. Possession date by May 15 of current fair year.
- d. A proof of purchase will be required before June 1st in order for calf to be tagged. Calves will be tagged by June 1st.
- e. Must be weaned two weeks before fair.

3. DAIRY FEEDERS

- a. All animals must be 100% dairy breed.
- b. All animals must be steers.
- c. All animals must be born after January 1 of current year.
- d. All animals must be dehorned or show evidence of dehorning.

4. SHEEP

- a. Must be wether or ewe.

- d. All market breed does must be tattooed and recorded in Extension Office by May 1.
- e. Committee member will checking be around July 15th for possession.
- f. No replacement of market pen after July 15th.
- g. Tattooing of market pen must be completed and recorded by July 15th.
- h. Market project is pen of 3.
- i. Age of pen - 69 days maximum.

The show will be non-competitive and judged separately. Projects allowed to show will be Crafts, Rabbits, Cavies, Poultry, Goats, Sheep, Llamas/Alpacas, Dogs, and Junior Beef. Projects of Steers, Dairy Feeders, Cow/Calf or Horses may participate in regular programming with an advocate assisting to ensure success in the show. Special need 4-H members may also participate in the regular shows with special accommodations.

5. Talking encouragingly to goat is allowed, but no yelling permitted.
6. Pack Obstacle Course will be awarded 15 points for each obstacle completed, additional items added to pack in advanced class is 10 points each. Use of collar or halter to maneuver animal will result in loss of 2 points per obstacle/use. Course time used as a tie breaker.

9. Age divisions are: Senior - 17 - 19, Junior. - 15 - 16, Sophomore 13 - 14, and Freshman 9-12.
10. Ribbons 1st-6th place in all classes. 1st & 2nd places in Showmanship are eligible to compete for Grand & Reserve Showman Rosettes.
11. Points will be tracked for High Point & Reserve Trophy from classes: Showmanship, English Equitation, English Pleasure, Stock Seat Equitation, Western Pleasure, and Trail. Ties for High Point will be broken by a questions developed by quorum of leaders present.
12. Teams of 4 will be chosen randomly by the 4-H Horse Superintendent from all division except Novice for Team Versatility. Teams will be posted Sunday and will compete in Showmanship, English Equitation, Stock Seat Equitation, and a "wildcard" class.
13. All riders in Hunt Seat classes, Gymkana, or in English appointments must wear an approved SEI helmet.
14. Riding with halter & lead rope or riding double is prohibited.
15. The 4-H exhibitor only shall handle their own animal unless prior approval is given by the Club Leader and the 4-H Superintendent is aware of approval.
16. Stalls must be stripped prior to departure from Fair.
17. Infractions of these rules and/or General Rules of Horse Division may result in dismissal of the exhibitor and/or animal from the Fairgrounds with all premiums forfeited.

2. All dogs to be exhibited at the Fair must be kept on a leash or crated. All leashes need be of sufficient length to show in obedience, made of leather or solid fabric. No chain leashes.
3. Copies of DHLPP and Rabies shot records need to be current for all dogs 4 months and older which must be given to the 4-H specie person prior to showing.
4. Members may only show one dog in obedience, showmanship, and agility. No two participants may show the same dog in showmanship, obedience, or agility with the exception of Cloverbuds.
5. Any clothing which draws undue attention to one's self, or clothing that distracts other handlers, spectators, or judges, is unacceptable (Example: blue jeans, t-shirts, sweatshirts, halter tops, low cut blouses or sweaters, mini-skirts or shorts). Flat shoes such as tennis shoes should be worn. No sandals, boots, or high heels allowed. Long hair should be tied back. No clothing with club name and/or personal identification will be allowed. Exhibitors not adhering to dress code will be asked to change or be disqualified.
6. Female dogs in season will not be allowed to show at the Fair.
7. Dogs with aggressive behavior or lameness may be excused from showing. Dogs with a physical disability (ex. loss of an eye or leg) will be allowed to show if a statement of fitness is provided from the veterinarian and should be sent with the vaccination records and registration.
8. Cloverbud 4-H members, ages 5-8 years, will have their own class in showmanship, obedience, and agility, and they will participate non-competitively. They will not compete beyond these classes.
9. If listed, 4-Her's with dogs that have obedience titles must show in the next advanced class. Also, dogs with a CD Degree may compete in Novice B Class for a period not to exceed six months from the date of the degree.
10. 4-H exhibitors who have won five or more classes in Junior Showmanship (with 4 or more in the class) will have to show in the Champion Class. This applies to classes in 4-H and non-4-H shows. Also, if the 4-Her's dog has a Champion title, they will have to show in the Champion Class, except where the 4-Her has never been in or shown a dog showmanship class before, or if the 4-Her only shows once or twice a year at the Fair. 4-Hers who have been showing over the years and get a Champion dog will need to show in the Champion Class.
11. First place winners in classes 8401, 8402, 8403, 8404, 8405, 8406, 8407, 8408 will compete for Grand Champion Showman. Reserve Champion will be picked from the remaining first place winners already in the ring, plus second place winners from the same classes.
12. Rules not listed, the judge will adhere to 4-H and/or AKC rules for Obedience and Showmanship.

JUNIOR SHOWMANSHIP

4960. CLOVERBUD - Member who is 5-8 years of age.

4961. JUNIOR NOVICE- Member who is age 9-13 years of age and has not won three 1st

places with competition present in a licensed novice class or 4-H dog show.

4962. JUNIOR NOVICE 1ST YEAR - Member who is 9-13 years of age and has never shown in any dog show or has been in any competition before. Also, the dog has never been shown before.

4963. JUNIOR OPEN - Member who is 9-13 years of age and has won three 1st places with competition present in a licensed novice class or 4-H dog show.

4964. SENIOR NOVICE - Member who is 14-19 years of age and has not won three 1st places with competition present in a licensed novice class or 4-H dog show.

4965. SENIOR NOVICE 1ST YEAR - Member who is 14-19 years of age and the dog has never been shown before.

4966. SENIOR OPEN - Member who is 14-19 years of age and has won three 1st places with competition present in a licensed novice class or 4-H dog show.

4967. CHAMPION- Member who has won 5 or more classes in Junior Showmanship with 4 or more in the class (includes 4-H and non-4-H shows) or the 4-Her's dog has a champion title. □ □

DOG OBEDIENCE:

“A” is for members and dogs that will be competing in their first first year. “B” is for members who have competed in “A” previously, or a new handler with a dog who has competed in Obedience previously.

1. Females in season will be allowed to show, but at the very end of the class. They will have their own series of sit and down exercise. They should be kept crated and/or away from the ring and other dogs until they are called. Please notify the ring steward or judge when receiving your arm-band

2. Qualifying Score - comprised of scores of more than 50% of the available points in each exercise and a final score of 170 points or more.

3. In the case of ties, it will be left up to the judge on how he/she wants to break the tie.

4. Pre-Novice will be on leash.

4970. CLOVERBUD - Handler 5-8 years of age.

4971. PRE-NOVICE A - New dog and new handler age 9 and older in first year of 4-H dog project.

4972. PRE-NOVICE B - Handler and/or dog that have competed in Pre-Novice A previously.

4973. NOVICE A - handler and/or dog that have received 3 qualifying scores (4-H or other) in Pre-Novice. A dog that is owned or co-owned by a person who has previously handled or regularly trained a dog that has won a CD title may not be entered in the Novice A Class, nor may a dog be handled in this class by such a person.

4974. NOVICE B - Handler and/or dog that have competed in the Novice-A previously.

4975. GRADUATE NOVICE A - Handler and/or dog that have completed the Novice level and have received 3 qualifying scores (4-H or other).

4976. GRADUATE NOVICE B - handler and/or dog that have experience in Graduate Novice A.

4977. OPEN A - Handler and dog who have completed Graduate Novice and/or received a CD in competition.

4978. OPEN B - For dogs that have competed in Open A and/or received a CDX title.

AGILITY:

1. Each class is divided into an A and B class. A is for members who will be competing at a level for the 1st year. B is for members who have competed in the A division previously or have not received their title or are competing with a new dog in this class.

2. At no time during competition is the handler allowed to touch the dog without being faulted.
 3. The dog must be at least a year old.
 4. For safety reasons, the handler and dog must have gone through agility classes in order to compete in the agility events.
 5. There will be a standard course time of 1.5-1.75 yards/second plus 5 seconds added for pause table. There is a 3 minute time limit per dog. To receive a qualifying score, a dog must pass with a score of 85 points or better out of 100 and not receive any non-qualifying deductions/elimination.
 6. Score deductions:
 - 1 point for every 2 seconds over the course time limit
 - 2 points for interference or outside assistance
 - 2 points for running the wrong course (such as taking an obstacle out of sequence)
 - 2 points for each time you touch your dog
 - 2 points for jumping on and off the table, the 5 second pause count will begin each time the dog jumps off or moves from required position (sit or down)
 - 2 points for tight leash
 - 5 points for refusing an obstacle (the dog puts four feet on a contact zone, jumps off but will attempt it again correctly, any significant pause or hesitation at an obstacle.) Points are deducted for each failed attempt.
 Beginners are allowed 2 refusals for each obstacle
 Intermediates are allowed 1 refusal or each obstacle
 5 points for knocking down a bar off a jump/additional
 5 points for each time the course repeats over a downed jump.
 7. Non-Qualifying/ Elimination:
 - Exceeding the maximum course time
 - Dog fouling the ring at any time
 - Excessive loudness or abuse in the ring
 - Dog leaves the course area and discontinues working
 - Failure to perform (refuses to continue on the course)
 - Food or toys on the course
 - Excessive leading or guiding the dog over obstacles or course
 - 3 refusals for beginners on any obstacle
 - 2 refusals for intermediates on any obstacle
 - 1 refusal for advanced on any obstacle
 - Flying off the end of the teeter-totter.
4980. CLOVERBUD - a handler 5-8 years old and a new dog in their first year of 4-H.
4981. BEGINNERS A - a new dog and/or handler in their first year of the 4-H dog project ages 9 or older. All dogs are to be on lead with buckle collar with jump heights of 8" and long jump 16" wide. Handlers will be allowed to jump over the jumps with their dog.
4982. BEGINNERS B - second year dog or handler and dogs who have not competed in a higher agility level. Jump heights are 8" and long jump 16" wide. Handlers will be allowed to jump the jumps with their dog.
4983. INTERMEDIATE AGILITY - for dogs who have received their beginning agility title (3 qualifying scores). This level is done off lead with jump heights of 12" and long jump 24" wide. Handlers will not be allowed to jump over the jumps with their dog. The course will include dog

walk and six weave poles (dogs must complete weave poles-no faults for several attempts).
 4984. **ADVANCED AGILITY** - for dogs that have received their intermediate agility title.
 This level is done off lead with additional obstacles and jump heights as follows:

over 20" At Withers	16"-20"	11"-15"	10"-Under
Jump Height: 20"	16"	12"	8"
Long Jump 40"	32"	24"	16"
Table Height 20"	16"	12"	8"□□
