

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Northwestern Michigan Fair Code of Conduct

Participants in the Northwestern Michigan Fair are subject to the observance of the program rules.

All Fair Attendees will:

- 1. Show respect for, and cooperate with fellow attendees, volunteers & Directors.
- 2. Follow Livestock Council policies & procedures when participating in any Livestock Council sponsored event.
- 3. Under no circumstances, attend any activity or event on Northwestern Michigan Fair property under the influence of alcohol and/or controlled substances (including tobacco, electronic cigarettes, etc.).
- 4. Under no circumstances, bring dangerous or unauthorized materials (such as fireworks, explosives, weapons, or similar items) to any event or activity that happens on the property of the Northwestern Michigan Fair.
- 5. Abstain from hazing, harassment or bullying of another participant, volunteer or staff member (either face-to-face interactions, through social media or other communication venues), particularly when the behavior is based on a person's appearance, race, color, national origin, gender identity, religion, height, weight, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or veteran status or other protected category under Federal Anti-Discrimination Policy.
- 6. All physical altercations, youth or adult, will be turned over to the Grand Traverse Sheriff and is a violation of this code.
- 7. By completing the NWMI Fair Registration you agree to abide by this Code of Conduct.

Any participant who violates this Code of Conduct is subject to discipline that may include:

- 1. Removal from the activity/event or the property where the event he or she is participating in is being held, including the Northwestern Michigan Fairgrounds.
- 2. Disqualification from all activities including the fair week and off season events that full calendar year. Zero Tolerance.
- 3. In cases involving possession or consumption of illegal drugs or possession or consumption of alcohol the proper law authorities will be contacted. Zero Tolerance.
- 4. During the week of fair the Northwestern Michigan Fair Directors have the right to discipline as they see fit in compliance with the Premium Book.

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



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GREETINGS FROM THE NWMF QUEEN

After being a part of the Fair my whole life I have had the honor to represent our community in the utmost special way possible. My goal for this year was to make people smile and show them that they are loved and that they matter. I am so thankful for this opportunity. It's a dream come true. Thank you to all my family, friends, and community who have supported me with so much love throughout my journey. This year I wrote an essay for one of my classes in college. I decided that I would share some of it with you.

The Crown of My Community

The day came to turn in my application. I second, then third, then sixth guessed myself. I was just about ready to throw my application in the trash and never attempt to run. My head was racing with doubts. I proceeded to tell myself that I was not good enough and I didn't deserve the honor to become such a big part of my community. I decided to just leave my application next to the trash and sleep on my terrible decision. Although...my mom had different plans for that application and it ended up in the hands of the Fair Board Committee. Now I really had to run. What did I just get myself into?

Today is the day, August 13, 2022, it's 5:30 in the morning, and I have already fed my lamb. I am hot, exhausted, and ready for the day to be over. The cold water is running down my back as I think about that elegant crown. Would that massive crown fit my head? I'm not going to win anyway. Is it actually as heavy as they say it is? I probably won't even find out. I don't even know why I think I could win. Five other girls and I think I stand a chance? Let's just get this day over with. "Ladies and gentlemen your 2022/2023 Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen is...."

The big man with a deep scary voice projected over the microphone. "It's time." Oh boy, is this real? I have been waiting for this very moment since I was a little girl. It's finally here. This entire week of wondering if I'm good enough, if I can actually achieve something so big, and if people were still going to support me. No way will they say my name. At least I had a great week. It doesn't matter if I win, the memories that were made are the only thing that matters.

"What does the fair mean to me?" I was the third girl in line. The first one walked out and onto the stage, gave her speech then walked back into the camper. Seeing the butterflies fly off her as she walked back in made me feel a little bit better. The second girl came back into the camper without the anchor she went out there with. Then it was my turn, I was shaking like I had just seen a ghost. How did these girls come back smiling? I'm going to come back in tears. "What does the fair mean to you?" Don't let others stop you from living out your dream. You will have absolutely no regrets.

I have dreamt of this day for a long time. I now finally have the honor.

I have learned that dreams do come true. So dream big, set goals, believe in yourself, and work hard to make your dreams come true.

Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen's Program – 2023-2024 Contract



- 1. Entrant must be between the ages of 17 -20 as of August 12, 2023.
- 2. Entrant must be a single female, never have been married, divorced, or have cohabited with a male in lieu of marriage. She must not be pregnant, nor have any children.
- 3. All entrants must be present during the week of the Northwestern Michigan Fair, August 5-12, 2023.
- 4. Entrant agrees to abide by all rules established by the Queen's Committee and must sign the Contestant's Contract to signify this agreement.
- 5. Entrant must reside in a county eligible to participate at the Northwestern Michigan Fair.
- 6. Entrant must be of good character and conduct. The Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen's Committee may refuse entry to any applicant felt to be lacking in good character or displaying poor conduct.
- 7. Entrant is not under contract to any person, firm, organization or corporation, nor have any other legal obligations that would prevent participation in the Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen Program.
- 8. Entrant will cooperate with the Program Director as to the format of the Program. Entrant agrees to time, manner and method of judging, which shall be solely within the discretion of the Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen's Committee, and further; and the decision of the judges and governing body will be final.
- 9. Entrant acknowledges that she has never held the Title of Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen.
- 10. Entrant must never have been convicted of a crime, is not or ever been a willing party to any wrong doing, corruption, or financial impropriety.
- 11. Contestants are not permitted to smoke or drink at ANY TIME during the competition. Contestants are expected to conduct themselves in such a manner so as not to bring discredit to herself, the program, or the Northwestern Michigan Fair.
- 12. Entrant agrees to dress appropriately when wearing their crowns and/or sashes. (no halter tops, tube tops, short shorts, or miniskirts, etc.). Body piercing, other than earrings (not past the second piercing) and visible tattoos are not acceptable when representing the Northwestern Michigan Fair.
- 13. Entrant agrees to maintain a positive image when posting on all types of social media (i.e. blogs, Facebook, twitter etc.). She acknowledges that the Queen's Committee may request she remove items of poor taste and/or those that may reflect negatively on the Fair or Queen's Program and agrees to honor these requests.
- 14. Contestant authorizes the use of contestants name and likeness for publication as the Northwestern Michigan Fair deems appropriate. This authorization shall include the use of all photographs, recordings, video or audiotapes made during the pageant itself or during a titleholders reign.
- 15. It shall be understood that any violation of the Contestant's Contract, which includes the above Rules & Regulations, may cause automatic elimination from further judging, without advance notice.
- 16. If chosen as the Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen, entrant will agree to a 1 year commitment with the Northwestern Michigan Fair and agrees to relinquish any other title presently held.

IF selected as the NORTHWESTERN MICHIGAN FAIR OUEEN, entrant MUST AGREE to the following:

- 1. If during the reign as Queen, she no longer meets the requirements of eligibility in the opinion of the Committee, she will forfeit her crown and all awards presented to her.
- 2. The Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen and Runner-up will be announced at the pageant on August 12, 2023. Throughout the year the Fair Queen will be required to attend and participate in numerous events. All appearances are scheduled, arranged and supervised by the Queen's Committee or designated agent so as to reflect the values and high standards of the program and to enhance its visibility within our community and state. 1st runner-up will have no continuing obligations, only in the event that the Queen is unable to finish her reign will she be called upon.
- 3. The Fair Queen shall NOT appear in public as the Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen without prior approval of the director, or a designated agent. She will make public appearances only in the presence of a chaperone officially appointed for her by the Director. Furthermore, she will not bring guests along with her while making appearances; this includes family members and boyfriends unless otherwise approved by the Director.
- 4. Continued failure to attend scheduled functions, violations of her contract, or public conduct which the Queen's Committee deems to be a discredit to the Program or to the Northwestern Michigan Fair, may result in action by the committee to remove the title.
 - 1. The Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen will receive a large crown, alternate crown, sash, and crown box. The Queen's Crowns are rotating crowns and shall be passed on to the 2023
 - 2. . Queen. Upon the end of her reign, the queen shall receive a keepsake crown and may also keep her sash. The Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen is responsible for the safe keeping of the crowns, box and items within the box. Should she should choose to keep a crown, or if any items becomes lost or stolen, she will be responsible for replacement costs (up to \$150.00).
- 6. The Fair Queen shall abide by the above stated physical appearance guidelines and agrees not to make any major alterations in physical appearance without approval by the Queen's Committee. This would include piercing (other than the ears), tattoos, dramatic changes in hair color or style, or other alterations that could be considered offensive.
- 7. The Queen will receive a \$1,000 scholarship paid directly to the educational institution of her choice. In the event that the Queen fails to abide by the rules and regulations governing this contest, she will immediately forfeit the aforementioned scholarship, and also forfeit the title of Northwestern Michigan Fair Queen if deemed necessary by the Queen's Committee. In the event that she does not wish to avail herself of the educational advantages of this scholarship, then she shall forfeit this scholarship.
- 8. If, after accepting the scholarship, she desires to discontinue her education, she shall forfeit any unused portion of this scholarship. In the event that she has not started to use the scholarship fund within one year of the contest, she shall forfeit the entire scholarship fund. The scholarship is non-transferable. Furthermore, it shall be understood that the scholarship will be made in two equal payments over the course of the queen's reign.

In the event that the best interests of a contestant are threatened by enforcing any of the rules or regulations, the rule may be waived by a majority vote of the Queen's Committee, upon written request to the committee.

THERE WILL BE NO PARKING INSIDE THE FAIRGROUNDS AUGUST 6TH THROUGH THE MORNING OF THE 13TH. ALL OTHER RULES AND GUIDELINES ARE EFFECTIVE SATURDAY AUGUST 5, 2023 AT 6PM. VEHICLES MUST BE OFF THE FAIRGROUNDS BY SATURDAY NIGHT BY 9PM!

Only entries from the five counties of Antrim, Benzie, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, and Leelanau will be accepted.

Animal registrations need to be submitted by July 1, 2023. Non-Animal registrations need to be submitted by July 14, 2023. There will be NO late registrations accepted. Payment for all fees must be submitted at the time of registration. NO ENTRY FEES WILL BE REFUNDED.

Exhibitors will be charged an entry fee of \$5.00 for every 10 classes entered. Exhibit tickets will be issued upon arrival. Special rules are given in each division. Please review department, section, and/or class rules for additional entry guidelines.

Every article or animal upon the Fairgrounds will be under the control of the Executive Committee, and every precaution will be taken for their safekeeping but, the Association will not be responsible for any damage or loss that may occur, and upon this condition entries are received. No unregistered house hold pets will be allowed to be marketed on the fairgrounds.

Dogs camping on the Fairgrounds must be kept on a leash no greater than 6 feet in length, under the immediate control of a responsible person and shall not be allowed to disturb any Fairgrounds visitors or animals. Service dogs are allowed. The handler of any dog shall immediately remove all droppings and deposit in trash receptacle on Fairgrounds. **KEEP DOGS IN CAMP AREA OR ON A LEASH.**

Minors under the influence of alcohol or illicit drugs will be reported to the Sheriff's Department and prohibited from returning to the Fairgrounds. Additional sanctions may be imposed by the Northwest Michigan 4-H Livestock Council. Refer to Code of Conduct Policy in the 4-H section of this Premium Book.

Trailers, tents, RVs, and buses must acquire their parking spot from the Camp Host before parking.

Vehicle parking in designated areas only! Parking in Fire Lane is not allowed. Vehicles will be towed at owner's expense.

ALL CAMPER VEHICLES MUST BE PARKED IN NORTH CAMP PARKING LOT OR IN DESIGNATED SIDE LOTS! **THERE IS NO PARKING IN PATRON PARKING LOT!** Any vehicles NOT in designated areas will be towed at owner's expense.

The Fairgrounds are private property: operated by a private entity.

There will be no open carry of firearms or carrying of fixed blade knives permitted on grounds!

The Fairgrounds are a drug free zone. There will be zero tolerance for the use of any illicit drug including recreational and medical marijuana. Any violator will be immediately removed from property.

Fighting will not be tolerated and can result in being removed from Fairgrounds in addition to a 1 year ban.

NO BIKES ARE ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS!

Kids wandering around after 11pm (curfew) will have consequences.

Violation #1: Escorted back to camp. Violation #2: Parking lot clean up detail.

Violation #3: Parents and child will have a meeting with the Executive Fair and Executive Livestock Council Boards

JUDGING

No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium. Where there is but one exhibitor in a class, the animal or article may be awarded any award the judge deems appropriate.

Exhibitors having questions regarding placing should check with the Division Superintendent as soon as the judging is completed.

No exhibitor, unless in the presence of the respective Superintendent, will discuss any placing with the respective judge.

APPEALS AND COMPLAINTS:

An exhibitor compelled to bring a complaint regarding conflict of interest of the judge, disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor; exhibitor or superintendent's behavior, or eligibility of an exhibit shall make formal protest in writing to a Fair Board Executive Committee Member no later than 10 days following the end of Fair. All protests shall be referred to a special committee which shall review the protest with interested parties and give parties an opportunity to submit evidence. Report of findings

GENERAL RULES & GUIDELINES

shall be made to the Fair Board for final decision on the protest 14 days following date protest issuance. The party against whom the protest was filed shall have the right to read the statement of protest. Exhibitor may file appeal to the Department of Agriculture within 45 days of filing the initial complaint if the exhibitor is not satisfied with the association's action.

The Department of Agriculture shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint, and shall issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and any recommended actions for the association.

Ribbons and rosettes will be awarded for all places as listed for each class, unless otherwise specified.

EXHIBITS: NON-ANIMAL

Non-livestock exhibits will be received Saturday August 5, 2023. Evelyn Heim Building - 10am to 2pm. See page 38. Tanner Building - 12pm to 6pm. See page 47. 4-H Thursday and Friday, August 3rd and 4th - 12pm to 9pm. Saturday - 10am to 2pm. See page 67. Please check department rules for exceptions and other instructions.

In no case shall any article be brought upon the grounds and placed upon exhibition except by and at the expense of their authorized agent.

EXHIBITS: ANIMAL

Please refer to individual departments and sections for additional rules and guidelines.

Exhibitors aged 5-7 years old are required to be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult in all show rings in order to participate in the class.

RFID tags are required for all Beef projects & Swine projects & 4-H identification tags are required for all market projects. Scrapies tags are required for sheep and goats.

Animals will be received Saturday August 5, 2023, 6:00am to 5:00pm and will remain on the grounds until Sunday August 13, 2023 at 6:00am (poultry department refer to department rules). Animals will not be permitted to leave early without appropriate arrangements. Exhibitors will forfeit the premium awarded if animals are removed before times slated. Exercise, feeding, and cleaning times for animals shall be before 9:00am and between 4:00pm and 6:00pm. All barns will be closed by 10:00pm. All barns and animal pens must be ready for public viewing by 9:00am daily.

An accredited veterinarian shall be on-call during the fair. Any individual services and/or disbursement of medication provided by the veterinarian shall be the responsibility of the individual.

Sawdust bedding will be furnished for all animals, with exception of fiber animals or waiver by veterinarian. Exhibitors are required to furnish all feed and supplies.

Stalls and pens will be provided for animals and assigned in the order of application. All beef and dairy animals will be secured by a nylon rope or chain around the neck and secured by a nylon rope or chain to a secured pipe.

Hay nets/ hay bags will be allowed at the discretion of the barn superintendent. If it poses as a threat to the safety and wellbeing of the animal, the hay net/bag will be removed and returned to the owner. This applies to goats and horses.

Animals occupying stalls and pens must be appropriately entered in the judge's book of the section and shown in competition.

Due to Bio Security, there will be no animals allowed off the trailer until they are inspected by the Superintendent.

Any prescriptions written pertaining to care of, special treatment or use of equipment to feed or supply water to any animal on the fair grounds during the week of Fair will be written on an individual basis. No group/family/farm prescriptions will be accepted, i.e. each horse, steer, chicken, etc will have its own individual prescription for care.

Copies of registrations, statement as to breeder, feeding and management of stock will be required from all exhibitors.

All exhibitors must be neat and cleanly dressed and must put the stalls, pens, and floors in a neat and tidy condition by 9:00am. Tack will be kept out of walkways. Infractions of these rules or other barn rules directed by the Superintendent in charge may result in dismissal of the exhibitor and their animal from the Fairgrounds.

All Animals entered for exhibition must be placed in the department prior to 5:00pm on Saturday, and if not so placed, the owners will forfeit all rights to exhibit or compete for premiums unless relieved from such results or forfeiture by order of the Superintendent of the department in which they are entered.

4-H market animals to be sold in the auction must be weighed on assigned scales only. Market livestock exhibitors are prohibited from entering NWMI Fair if the exhibitor has entered any 4-H market animal at any other fair in this calendar year.

Any animal suspected of being on tranquilizers or other drugs may be subject to testing at the direction of three or more members of the NWMI Livestock Council and NWMI Fair Board.

GEN. RULES & GUIDELINES

The NWMI Fair may perform livestock testing by an "at random" or "for cause" selection process by following these steps:

- The initial complaints in writing must be received by the Fair Board detailing complainant's reason for requesting testing.
- 2. A written reply from the exhibit owner regarding their response to the complaint must also be received by the Fair Board.
- 3. The fair board will review the case and may, at their discretion, request a licensed veterinarian to collect a sample of urine, blood, tissue or other specimen for testing. If the Fair Board requests a sample be collect ed, it will be done within 12 hours of the complaint being received by the Fair Board.

The Northwestern Michigan Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animals, either alive or slaughtered, wherein the exhibitor/owner of the animal entered into competition refuses to allow the animal to be tested, or the drug test is positive for substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration, the United States Department of Agriculture or the Michigan Department of Agriculture. This includes, but is not limited to diuretics, steroids, repartitioning agents, tranquilizers, and analgesics. Exhibitors will notify the Fair veterinarian before administering any medications to any animal brought in for competition. The exhibitor will forfeit auction privileges, premiums, and awards. Other animals will not be moved up in placing.

Michigan Department of Agriculture 2023 Health Requirments for Livestock Exhibited In Michigan

All livestock exhibitors must be in compliance with the animal health requirements as defined by the Michigan Department of Agriculture & Rural Development.

- Bulls a year old must be fastened by a ring in the nose and secured by chains around the neck or they will be barred from remaining on the ground.
- Exhibitors must place their names and addresses, also the breed, name and age of each animal exhibited upon a card, in a conspicuous place in the stall.
- Exhibitors must be 5 years or older. With the exception of the Large Beef which is 13 years or older or 12 years of age with 2 years cattle show experience. Age computed from January 1st of current year.
- Cattle must be entered by bona fide owners, which of a firm or association must be joint property of such firm and association and not of the individuals thereof

Documentation will be accepted by one of the following:

- A. Hatchery source documentation.
- B. Entire flock or individual bird test report USDA VA 9-2 or VS 9-3.
- C. Michigan Department of Agriculture pullorum testform with owner certificate.
- D. Statement provided by pullorum tester and/or accredited Veterinarian.
- Owner certification statement with all of the above forms; providing verification of birds being presented for pullorum test and isolation form unknown status poultry since pullorum test negative.
- Pullorum testing will be available at the Fairgrounds on first Saturday of Fair from 10:00am to 2:00pm. There will be no charge for pullorum testing.
- Poultry cannot be entered in both Open and 4-H.
- Please be sure to read through all the general rules at the beginning of this book.
- Registrations must be submitted by July 1, 2023. Late registrations will not be accepted. No exceptions.
- The superintendent reserves the right to adjust or arrange classes as numbers see fit.
- Exhibitors must be 5 years of age or older. Age computed from January 1st of current year.
- Exhibitors 5-7 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult in the show ring.
- Exhibitors may remove birds from exhibition coop for the purpose of showmanship at the time of showmanship only!
- Poultry showing any symptoms of disease will be excluded from exhibition
- Stock must be entered in the name of the actual owner(s).
- All poultry to be judged by the American Standard of Perfection and Bantam Breed of Perfection.
- Judges may refuse to award premiums to any bird or animal that does not possess sufficient merit.
- The poultry terms as follows: Cock and hen are birds one year old and over; Cockerel and pullet are birds less than one year.
- Birds entered singly cannot compete for pairs or pens. Pairs are male & female of same breed.
- All exhibits will be banded by the NWMI before exhibiting.

- Not allowed due to DNR regulations and permit requirement- Hungarian Partridge, Ruffled Grouse,
 Sharp Tailed Grouse, Wild Turkey, Ducks (all North American species, except Mallards), Geese (Canada subspecies and Blue-Snow Geese), Pheasants (Ringneck, Sichuan and look alikes from the Genius Phasianus), Quail (Bobwhite).
- ILT vaccinated poultry will not be accepted for entry.
- PREMIUM: Exhibitors will receive ribbons for their appropriate placing of 1st through 6th places, unless otherwise specified. 1st place recipient will receive a premium of \$2.00.
- Daily attention to poultry exhibits is required.

Poultry open exhibit rules:

- Barn duty is required to be signed upon entry.
- Exhibitors in Open Classes are required to follow the same rules as the Youth Division. To include barn duty, proper care and daily attendance, such as, morning and evening care of their poultry exhibits.

- All horses and ponies for exhibition must be free from infections and contagious diseases. The Fair Board reserves the right to remove unfit animals from the grounds.
- Horses and ponies must be sound to compete.
- All horses and ponies shall be in by 5:00pm Saturday
 August 5, 2023 and will remain until 6:00 am Sunday,
 August 13th unless appropriate arrangements have been
 made.
- Horse and rider combinations may only compete in one showmanship class.
- No horse or pony shall be entered in more than one halter class except Championship classes.
- Ages of animals will be computed from January 1st of the current year.
- Exhibitor's age will be computed from January 1st of the current year. Exhibitors must be 6 years of age or older, except the lead line.
- For exhibitors 6 years old & younger (leadline riders), adults must be aware of the youngsters safety. When exhibitors 6 years old and younger are working with horses, assistance must be provided one-on-one by a parent, guardian or adult volunteer who is on the ground holding the animal's lead rope which is attached to a halter to maximize safety.
- For exhibitors 6-9 years old (Pee Wee riders) Extra adults should be available to help before classes as well as being available as spotters while the exhibitor is in the ring.

DEPARTMENT 15 - HORSES CONT.

DEPARMENT RULES CONTINUED:

- For exhibitors 6-9 years old participating in walk/trot classes, exhibitors must have adult volunteers in the ring with them at all times.
- We encourage adult riders to wear a helmet. Exhibitors 19 years and younger are required to wear a helmet when riding any discipline.
- Each class entry shall be charged a \$4.00 entry fee except championship classes.
- Exhibitors of horses and ponies will be required to perform for the exhibit under the direction of the judge. Exhibitors will be required to follow the directions of the judge and announcer. Failure to follow directions will result in disqualification. The judge has the power to rule out of competition all who do not comply with the requirements.
- A Novice Rider or showman is considered a first year show person.

- Pee Wee classes are for ages 6-9.
- Pee Wee, Novice, or Rookie may use any legal bit that parent or leader feels is safe for the child regardless of age of horse.
- Bit must be appropriate for the seat.
- For Special Classes: Leadline must have helmet and use stirrups. Horses must have a halter with lead rope, not just a bridle.
- All stalls are filled on a first come, first serve basis.
 This will be based on the pre-registration date received at the Fair Office.
- The right to split classes is based upon the discretion of the Superintendent and/or judge.
- When riding you must wear a shoe/boot with a stepped heel.
- "Unsafe actions" determined by the Superintendent or infractions of these rules, involving an exhibitor is grounds for dismissal of the exhibitor and their animal from the Fairgrounds with all premiums being forfeited.
- Exercise time will be announced at the barn meeting.
- Horses may only be handled by the exhibitor or owner unless permission is given by the Superintendent and Species Chair.
- Horses need to be in stalls or arenas unless otherwise stated by the superintendent.
- There must be 3 entries to hold a class. Superintendent has the right to reassign classes to control class size.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Youth participation in any 4-H Livestock Council activity must follow:

4-H Members will:

- 1. Show respect for, and cooperate with, fellow members, volunteers, and staff.
- 2. Follow 4-H policies and procedures (including 4-H Livestock Council procedures) when participating in any 4-H sponsored event.
- 3. Under no circumstances, sell or consume alcohol or possess, sell or use controlled substances at an MSU Extension 4-H youth activity or event.
- 4. Under no circumstances attend or participate in an MSU Extension 4-H youth activity or event under the influence of alcohol and/or controlled substances including tobacco, electronic cigarettes, vapes, etc.
- Under no circumstances bring dangerous or unauthorized materials (such as explosives, weapons or similar items) to an MSU Extension 4-H youth activity or event.
- Under no circumstances, commit or threaten violence toward any individual, group, the 4-H Livestock Council, or the Northwestern Michigan Fair Board.
- 7. Abstain from harassment or bullying of another participant, volunteer, or staff member (either in face to face interactions, through social media or other communication venues), particularly when the behavior is disrespectful as regards to a person's gender, race, age, sexual orientation, religion, national origin, disability or appearance.
- 8. Not cheat or falsely represent efforts related to 4-H project activities.

Any participant who knowingly violates this Code of Conduct is subject to discipline that may include:

- 1. Removal from the activity/event he or she is participating in.
- 2. Disqualification from some or all 4-H Livestock Council activities including auction for the following year.
- 3. Contact of Law Enforcement authorities if youth are in possession of or under the influence of alcohol and/ or controlled substances including tobacco, electronic cigarettes, etc.
- 4. Seniors not being permitted to return the next year & participate in the 4-H Livestock program or auction as a "Super Senior".
- 5. During the week of fair, the NWMI Fair Board members have the right to discipline as they see fit in compliance with the NWMI Fair policies and rules as posted and printed in the current year's Premium Book.

Categories include: Mini/Pony, Pleasure (Saddle Horse) or Draft. 4-Hers may not bring two horses in the same category to exhibit. All stall/class fees apply to each horse.
- All classes will be judged using Michigan 4-H Project Show Rules and Regulations.
- Classes with more than 16 entries will be divided in 2 random splits. Each split will be judged and placed separately. Classes with 3 or less exhibitors may be combined at the Species chair's discretion.
- Showmanship, Trail, Equitation and Horsemanship will run patterns. An order of go will be used in pattern classes if needed to keep the flow of the show.
- Exhibitors may ride in ONE division (Walk Only, Miniature Horse/Small Equine, Novice, Rookie, Gymkhana, Ages 8-12, Ages 13-15, Ages 16-19) per horse/rider combination for the entire show.
- Novice division is for riders in first year of showing (cloerbud years do not count) Riders aged 8-10 years old may choose to ride in the novice or rookie division. Novice classes are walk-trot only.
- A Rookie Rider is a second-year walk/trot rider (Cloverbud years do not count) or is a new rider/horse combination. Rider/horse combination may not have won grand or reserve in the rookie division in past years.
- Points will be traced per division for High Point & Reserve Trophy.
 - High Point divisions are: Walk Only, Miniature Horse/Small Equine, Novice, Rookie, Gymkhana, Ages 8-12, Ages 13-15, Ages 16-19, Speed WtC, Speed WT.
- All riders must wear an approved helmet at all times while riding, no matter the discipline.

- Cloverbud, Novice, or Rookie may use any legal bit that parent or leader feels is safe for the child regardless of the horse's age. Bit must be appropriate for discipline.
- The 4-H exhibitor or owner of the horse shall only handle the horse unless prior approval is given by the club leader and the 4-H Horse Species Chair.
- Youth ages 5 through 7 may be involved with a horse but they must be directly assisted one-on-one by a registered volunteer who is on the ground holding the horse's lead (which is attached to a halter) to maximize safety. During exercise times fair week please use your best judgement and do what is best for the child. Species Chair and Assistant reserve the right to only allow Cloverbuds to ride directly assisted one-on-one by a registered volunteer who is on the ground holding the horse's lead if safety calls for it.
- 4-H Cloverbuds who are 7 may be involved with a horse, assisted by an adult registered volunteer who is in the ring with the participant at all times. Walk/ trot experiences may be an appropriate activity for children in this age group. This applies during exercise times as well as shows during fair.

DEPARTMENT RULES:

- Exhibitors can obtain a copy of Agility for 4-H Guide from your local 4-H office, the local 4-H website or the Northwest Michigan Livestock Council website.
- · No females in season may show.
- · Open to youth who belong to a 4-H group.
- All dogs to be exhibited at the Fair must be kept on a leash or crated. All leashes need to be 6 feet in length to show in obedience, made of leather or solid fabric. No chain leashes.
- Copies of DHLPP or DHPP and Rabies shot records need to be current for all dogs 6 months and older which must be given to the 4-H specie person prior to showing.
- Members may only show in ONE obedience, showmanship, agility, and rally class. Member may use a different dog for each event. No two participants may show the same dog in obedience, showmanship, agility, or rally with the exception of Cloverbuds.
- Any clothing which draws undue attention to one's self, or clothing that distracts other handlers, spectators, or judges, is unacceptable (Example: blue jeans, t-shirts, sweatshirts, halter tops, low cut blouses or sweaters or shorts). Shorts may be worn for agility and rally only and must be midthigh length- no exceptions. Skirts need to be knee length. Flat shoes such as tennis shoes should be worn. No sandals, boots, or high heels allowed. Long hair, should be tied back. No clothing with club name and/or personal identification will be allowed. Exhibitors not adhering to dress code will be asked to change or be disqualified.
- Dogs with aggressive behavior or lameness may be excused from showing. Dogs with a physical disability (ex. Loss of an eye or leg) will be allowed to show if a statement of fitness is provided from the veterinarian and should be sent with the vaccination records and registration.
- Cloverbud 4-H members, ages 5-7 years, will have their own class in showmanship, obedience, agility, and rally and they will participate non-competitively. They will not compete beyond these classes.
- Showmanship- First place winners in each class (except Cloverbud) will compete for Grand and Reserve Champion Showmanship. Grand and Reserve Rosettes.
- Rules not listed, the judge will adhere to 4-H and/or AKC rules for all events.



For the safety of all fairgoers the following rules are in effect when the vehicle is unloaded at the fairgrounds. With everyone's cooperation we can continue the convenience of using golf carts/UTVs during fairweek:

- 1. Only campers in the north campground and campers with a valid handicap permit from the State of Michigan are permitted to have golf carts/UTVs.
- 2. Handicap permit holders must be present on the cart while it is in motion. Registered handicap golf carts/UTVs are allowed to go near the barns, but are not allowed inside the barns, concession area, or to enter the midway.
- **3.** Hours of operating golf carts/UTVs are between 6am 11pm. (Fair carts excluded).
- **4.** No carts/UTVs are allowed on Zeke's Way. Carts/UTVs shall stay in the north campground, north campground parking lot, and on the road between the campground and cart corral next to the Junior Beef barn. Carts/UTVs must be parked at the cart corral next to the Jr.Beef barn. No carts/UTVs are permitted beyond this point. (Fair carts excluded).
- **5.** One person per seat in a cart/UTV. Each person must be seated at all times.
- **6.** No driving carts/UTVs under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Also no open intoxicants will be allowed. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 7. All carts/UTVs must have mounted or fixed working headlights to be on grounds. The rear of the cart/UTV must have at least 2 inches of affixed reflective product or working tail lights. No single seated or modified vehicles will be allowed. All those registering carts/UTVs must possess an insurance policy that provides \$300,000 liability insurance coverage for operation of the vehicle on the fairgrounds. The written document of this coverage must be submitted when the vehicle is registered.
- **8.** Driver must have a valid driver's license to operate cart/UTV and be in the operator's possession when operating.
- **9.** All carts/UTVs must be present at the fair office on Saturday, August 3rd from 8pm 10pm. Bring proof of insurance, handicap permit if applicable and valid driver's license. Carts/UTVs will be inspected for working headlights, tail lights or reflective product, quiet exhaust and working brakes. If carts/UTVs pass inspection, the fair staff will place handicapped stickers when applicable on the front and back of the cart/UTV and a mandatory NWMF registration sticker on the front.
- **10.** Limit 1 cart/UTV per campsite. (Fair carts excluded).
- 11. At all times carts/UTVs must maintain a safe operating speed, not to exceed 5 ½ mph. (Fair carts excluded in case of emergencies)
- 12. NWMF reserves the right to refuse registration of any golf cart/UTV.
- 13. No recreational or sightseeing usage allowed.
- **14.** Golf carts/UTVs must be operated in a safe and orderly manner.
